Connor Bourgonje is a 5th year PhD student in the Scaiano Lab. His research focuses on designing light activated nanomaterials for applications in catalysis, medicine, and water treatment. As a proud member of the Métis Nation of Alberta, Connor has a deep interest in identifying and addressing the barriers that limit Indigenous participation in STEM. Connor is a founding member of the uOttawa Alliance Supporting Indigenous Science Students (uOASISS), serving as a mentor for Indigenous science students, and acting in an advisory role to help drive Indigenous initiatives in the Faculty of Science

Sue McKee has an MSc in Biology and is the Director of the Let's Talk Science program at the University of Ottawa and Carleton University. She has been a volunteer with Let's Talk Science for 25 years, doing hands-on STEM activities with children and youth in schools and community organizations. The program has grown immensely under her direction in the areas of supporting youth from diverse backgrounds especially Indigenous youth, Black youth, and youth in low socio-economic areas. The uOttawa site is one of over 55 Let's Talk Science sites across Canada. Volunteers (university undergraduate and graduate students) go into classrooms and community organizations bringing fun, hands-on, minds-on workshops for children and youth.

Agape Williams is entering her 4th year in Biomedical Sciences with a Neuroscience focus at the University of Ottawa. She loves to volunteer in many diverse opportunities, and this summer, has been occupied as a research student, studying the locomotion of blue-spotted salamanders.
